We look forward to the busy fall season and wish you all a very nice summer.




Meet MIP New Staff

Voluntary airport pickup program helps first-year international students & visiting scholars feel welcome in their new home

The airport pickup program, which is a key component of the partnership of CSSA and MIP, helps incoming international freshmen arrange better transportation from the airport to the dorms.

American universities, which for half a century have attracted the world's best and brightest students, are flushed with international students who made their journeys from all over the globe.

According to the 2017 Graduate Enrollment and Degrees report from the Council of Graduate Schools, in Fall 2017, international graduate students constituted approximately 20 percent of total enrollment.

The number of international graduate students enrolled at UW-Madison is significantly higher. The number of international graduate students was close to 2,652 in Fall 2017, close to half the number of American graduate students at 4,780, according to the office of the registrar at UW-Madison.

For incoming international students, many of whom have never been to the US, finding transportation from airports to campus dorms is challenging due to lack of familiarity of transportation options.

"It's hard for us to get around because it's such a large country," said Yanling Wang, a UW-Madison freshman majoring in computer science. "It would be difficult if nobody picks me up when I first arrived at the airport. Honestly, I don't even know which bus to take to go to my place."

Driven by the increasing demand for transportation assistance, the Chinese Student Scholars Association (CSSA) at UW-Madison initiated a partnership with Madison International Partners (MIP) in 2013 to help incoming international students with transportation.

According to Jean Rene, the Executive Director of MIP, he and his staff try their best to help the international community because of the difficulties that international freshmen might face when they first arrive in town.

"Their parents & new students are usually very anxious about what's going to happen once the child arrived here," Jean- Rene said. "To relieve that fear, we have a number of programs and activities that make them feel welcome help them feel at home in Madison, even though they are living away from home."

The airport pickup program is where American volunteers, who live in town, volunteer to drive first-year international students from the Dane County Airport to their dorms. The sign-up form can be found on both CSSA's WeChat account and MIP's websites.

MIP was created initially as the international outreach ministry of Christ Presbyterian Church but became an independent organization after a large involvement of more members of the Madison community.

Kao Yong Thao, the international student advisor who oversees International Student Orientation at UW-Madison, views the airport pickup program between CSSA and MIP as a good opportunity for international students, though said she has not heard about this program since she is new to her position.

"I think it is a cool opportunity," Thao said. "I am always really amazed by the effort that our students currently devote towards supporting their peers and making sure they are getting the resources they need as they are transitioning to campus."

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Like most internationals I have no "blood relations" in Wisconsin. But I have "family" in Madison.

This is also true for many of the internationals who participate in MIP programs. You hear it from them all the time. They say the people in the program they participate in, whether it is English Conversation Time or International Spouse Connection or whatever, have become their family in Madison.

But in some cases, they carry it even farther. I know because a young Chinese man asked me to take one of the family seats he was allocated at the UW Law School hooding ceremony this month.

I met John (whose real name, Yuzhen Shang, I didn't learn until the hooding ceremony) last August when I picked up he and a Shanghai Jiao Tong University Law School classmate at the bus stop by Memorial Union. It was a warm, clear night with stars sparkling overhead. But they weren't enjoying it. They were tired, jet lagged and stressed. They had had a problem with immigration at O'Hare and missed the bus they intended to be on.

So, rather than rushing them into the car, I walked us around the side on the Union to where a Terrace After Dark event was just finishing up. They saw the throngs of young people laughing and having a good time in one of Madison's most iconic settings and had their first real American hotdog and a beer.

Then, I dropped the now smiling but still disoriented and exhausted pair and their tons of suitcases off at the AirBnB where they were staying until their apartments were available to them and arranged to come get them and their stuff in a couple of days to take them to their new homes away from home.

On that second ride, I invited them to English Conversation Time. They both came that week, but only John, whose English was much better than his classmate's, returned week after week. When his girlfriend arrived unexpectedly from China with the intention of staying for the entire school year on a tourist visa, he brought her and introduced her to me. Jean Rene and I turned out to be the two Americans she was most comfortable with.

John and Vicky became some of most regular Friday night attendees for the entire school year and every time I was there I drove them to their apartment after the session. That let us talk one-on-one in private, building a cross generational friendship.

John and I were already friends on WeChat, the Chinese equivalent of Facebook and Messenger and a whole lot of other apps rolled into one, and we carried on even more private conversations there. At times, there are things you can't talk to your mother or your girlfriend about but that you can talk to an unrelated, old female -- who is even from another culture -- about.

By the time Thanksgiving arrived, it was natural to make sure John and Vicky were among my holiday guests. When they went back to China for winter break the next month, I heard from John on WeChat frequently as he got ready to go meet Vicky's parents and then when he was about to introduce her to his parents. It turned out, much to everyone's delight, that all those encounters went well.

When they returned for his second semester in the Legal Institutions Masters of Law Degree Program they participated in even more of the MIP programs, going skiing at Devil's Head and volunteering at Second Harvest, while continuing as regulars at English Conversation Time.

In April, when the 40 students in his program elected John to be their speaker at the hooding ceremony, he asked me to be his family there. Although the ceremony was live-streamed to China where his parents could see it and Vicky was with me, John wanted me there in loco parentis – not in that disciplinary way that people my age are familiar with from their college years, but to truly stand in for his parents. I was proud to do it! Family is important.

MIP Volunteer Opportunities

Temporary Hosting (August 1st-31st)

The Temporary Hosting opportunity allows you to open your house to an international student for up to four nights when he/she first arrive in Madison as a way to welcome them and help ease their transition to their new environment. This is an invitation to provide welcome and friendship; there is no charge. If you have a spare bedroom and can host for 2 to 4 days anytime between August 1st and August 31st, please let us know.

Airport/Bus Station Pick up (July 30th - August 31st)

Through this opportunity, you will help pick up a new student at the Dane County airport or the bus station and deliver them to their apartment or dormitory. All the information about the student and the place to drop them off will be given to you in advance. Again, this is a wonderful way to show American hospitality to someone who arrives to America for the first time.

Tour of Madison (Monday September 2nd from 1 to 5:30 pm,)

The Tour of Madison is a unique opportunity to welcome new international students in Madison, meet new friends, and make a long lasting impression on new comers. Volunteer drivers use their own cars to help transport the student around town following a route specially designed for the occasion.
