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A busy Fall

For Madison International Partners, fall is usually its busiest season. Indeed, it marks the beginning of a new cycle as a new academic year starts with thousands of new internationals coming to Madison to pursue their academic dreams. For many of them, it is their first time to leave their families and countries to be here in America. Some of them need help with their English, while others struggle with culture shock and adapting to life here. These are unique challenges that Madison International Partners has been able to respond to through its many programs and activities. In fact, our dedicated body of volunteers always enthusiastically respond to the call to duty to make international feel welcome and at home here even though they live far away from home.

This fall, we were able to provided airport and bus depot pick ups to more than 180 new international students and visiting scholars, provided temporary housing to 5 internationals, took 19 of them to the traditional Tour of Madison and had 150 internationals participate to our annual Apple picking and Picnic.

We also respond to the needs of internationals as they arise. For example, we noticed that over the years most internationals we pick up from the airport or bus depots are usually dropped off in dorms or apartments with no equipment such as bedsheets, lamps, plates, silverware, brooms and more, items that can be found only at retail stores such at Walmart and Target. Given that those retail stores are not easily accessible from the campus area, we decided to provide on 2 separate Saturdays 2 shopping trips to Walmart and Target which allowed more than 125 new internationals to get items they needed to equip their dorms and apartments. Our new van was very instrumental in making these trips possible.

A busy fall set tone for an exciting academic year full of meaningful activities, connections, and stories which we are all looking forward to.



A Picnic in the Heat to Wrap up the Summer







MIP annual picnic which usually takes place in July is one of the most anticipated events that internationals look forward to. It happens once a year and gives them the opportunity to enjoy one of American's favorite activities: cook out. They like the picnic because it allows them to hang out with Americans in a relaxed environment, learn about American culture, play games, and enjoy some typical American food (burgers, brats, hot dogs, baked beans, and ice cream).

This year's picnic held on July 19 was a great success despite the high heat and the power outage that affected Madison We had a great picnic with about 175 people in attendance, many of whom were able to still play outside despite the high heat and come inside to cool off in the air conditioned room. Food was excellent, the camaraderie was great, and we had fun. Everyone went home happy.







Welcome to America!

Picking up new internationals at airports and bus depot to drop them off at their dormitories and apartment is a welcoming service we have been providing with internationals for many years in partnership with student organizations and high education institutions such as UW Madison and MATC. These are new international student coming to the university to further their education. They range from freshmen to PhD students. We understand that the first impression made on someone who moves to a new place can last with them for a lifetime. That's why we think this is a very service we offer as many new students and parents worry about the unknown as they embark on the journey. This year, we provided airport and bus depot pick ups to about 180 new international students, visiting scholars and families. Kudos to our wonderful volunteers who made all this possible.





Shopping Trips to Walmart and Targets for New Internationals

This year we launched a new service to welcome and hospitality package to internationals by providing trips to Walmart and Target where they could buy some of the supplies they so much need for their dorms or apartments and which they cannot find easily around campus. We set up two of such trips. The first one happened on August 17, with our volunteers taking 27 new international students to Walmart and Target. The second shopping trip took place on August 31 and involved 17 volunteers who took 85 new internationals shopping at Target & Walmart.

And some really dedicated volunteers helping to set up the farm to receive the whole group of internationals. While they waited to eat, kids played with toys all over the lawn while adults sat down on blankets and socialized. I saw so many adorable moments and had so many great conversations.

When it was time to eat, Jean-Rene stood on a chair and gave a speech. He talked about the importance of friendship, being welcoming to those from other places, and spreading God's love. He made it clear that there were food options for vegetarians and Muslims, and that they should line up first. As soon as the speech was over though, it was a bit of a free-for-all. Luckily, I'm confident everyone with a restricted diet got plenty of food they could eat. There was just so much food to go around!

As people ate they socialized more, played some yard games, and relaxed in the shade. Just before heading home, the Henderson's friends brought over some horses for us to interact with! This was really cool. I learned that horses can grow to be as old as 50 years old! The ones brought to the farm were between 24 and 30.

I really enjoyed Apple Picking and Picnic this year. It was a great event with a great turnout. Hats off to Jean-Rene and all the volunteers to help make this possible.
